LETTER FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Church,

As summer begins, we are reminded once more how wonderful it is to be in North Carolina. Especially here in the Triangle, opportunities to rest and find sabbath in the mountains or on the shoreline are just a car ride away. Gathering by the lake or in one of our gorgeous parks for a campfire or cookout takes very little planning. And should we want to stay in and out of the heat and gaze at the orange and purple sunset from the window or porch, many of us have the great privilege of doing so. Thanks be to God for that!

And thanks be to God, also, for the true gift of such sabbath time: to rest in order that we may be refreshed and recharged for service to the God of all creation! This call to Sabbath is so important in fact that Sabbath-keeping, as you will remember, makes it into the top 10 commandments!

This summer, our church will be taking on this Sabbath command in at least three important ways:

- Second, our Mission Ministry is coordinating conversations among members of the congregation and “Read and Feed,” an after-school program whose purpose is to improve literacy in school-age children. An event is scheduled for June 28 to learn more about the possibility of First Presbyterian becoming a parent in that effort.
- Finally, leaders, especially with Worship Ministry are looking to this fall and a special worship service in September or October to commemorate the 70th anniversary of the founding of our Congregation. More information will be forthcoming on these plans, to, as they develop.

So as we begin another summer together, dear church, I pray that each of you will have the opportunity for rest and renewal amid the wonders of God’s creation. And I pray that we all will discover in that time, a new possibility for welcoming, caring, for and inspiring our friends, neighbors, and even strangers to make a difference in the world God so loves.

EARTH CARE CORNER

THE HIDDEN DANGER OF FAST FASHION

Have you seen the newest fashion trend? Of course you have! It's all over TikTok, YouTube, TV, and magazines these days. But does it make you wonder what happened to all the trends and fads of yesteryear? What happens is that those clothes are thrown away, only worn a few times, and left to rot in landfills or be burned.

The mass overproduction of clothing leads to nearly 82 pounds of clothing waste per person in the US every year, with excess clothing ending up in massive, open-air landfills in the Global South. And if these clothes are burned instead, that leads to the release of a cocktail of toxic chemicals, including carbon monoxide, hydrogen cyanide, and plastic microfibers. The creation of these clothes is over 10% of total world carbon emissions, and worse, most of these cheap, fast fashion clothes are produced in third-world sweatshops.

Brands will often source labor from countries with notoriously weak labor laws, subjecting workers to forced overtime, wage theft, and grueling 14- to 16-hour days. Workers in these environments frequently handle dangerous chemicals without proper ventilation and face extreme safety hazards, tragically highlighted by structural collapses like the Rana Plaza disaster in Bangladesh that killed 1,134 garment workers. The supply chain relies heavily on marginalized populations and children. Globally, less than 2% of garment workers earn a living wage.

The industry is also one of the leading consumers of water. Did you know one pair of jeans can take roughly 2000 gallons of water to make? Textile dyeing also accounts for approximately 20% of global wastewater, often dumping toxic dyes and "forever chemicals" (PFAS) directly into local water sources. More than 60% of textiles contain synthetic plastics like polyester, which do not decompose. Laundering these synthetic garments releases hundreds of thousands of microfibers into our oceans with every wash.

How can you help? The best way to do your part and not contribute to this waste is:

1. Buy clothing from companies that pay their workers a fair wage and don't harm the environment. FashionChecker.org and GoodOnYou.eco are two websites you can use to check on clothing before you purchase.
2. Donate any clothes you no longer want or that don't fit instead of throwing them away.
3. Don't buy clothing you will only wear a few times before getting rid of it.

By working together to stand against the current industry standard, we can inspire and change in the textile business. We can only do this if we make a stand and hold our ground.

DAVID PEASE – 2026 MAN OF THE YEAR

The First Presbyterian Church of Garner Man of the Year Award is presented in recognition of men who exemplify faithful Christian service by dedicating their time and talents to their church and community. The year's Man of the Year recipient, David Pease, started attending our church in 1968. He officially joined on March 31, 1971. He was very involved in Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts. He served as Junior Assistant Scout Master, earned God and Country through the church by Sam Burgess under Troop 391, and was awarded his Eagle Scout on March 7, 1972, under Troop 335. He has served as Elder in 1989, 2008, 2018, and 2026. All four terms he has served on as a member of the Building and Grounds Committee. Some of David's committee activities include remodeling the Sanctuary with wood wainscoting & re-staining pews, remodeling the downstairs bathrooms, fixing the water leak under the fellowship concrete floor, and building the handrails in the Sanctuary. He is known for his saying when problems pop up... "I can't, but I know a guy". His impact to the Garner and Guatemala community is unmatched. He was the first certified rescue diver with the Garner rescue squad in 1975. He has been chief of Reds for 37 years and has more rescue and state certifications than can fill the Grand Canyon. He has organized equipment procurement and training mission trips to Guatemala for 15 years, and in 2010, he was awarded the Ambassador of Peace to Guatemala. He has coordinated rescue efforts for 18 hurricane deployments. During deployment for Hurricane Ivan, the team members who participated won a national award for their rescue efforts, and the Reds team was awarded Rescue of the Year and a letter from the NC Governor. He has a servant's heart and will do anything he can to help someone. Thank you, David, for your service to our church and community, and congratulations!



DEB WALLACE – 2026 PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN HONORARY LIFE MEMBERSHIP

The Honorary Life Membership program was established in the Presbyterian Church to honor faithful service to the women's organization and to the church. More than a thousand women (and a few men) across the country receive this honor each year. This year's First Presbyterian Garner Honorary Life Membership recipient, Debra Wallace, has been involved with our church activities for over 30 years. She has been a member of our church since the early 1990's. After joining the church, she and her husband, Kevin, volunteered for many years as Middle School Advisors. She also assisted with Vacation Bible School back when it was a weeklong event. In 2003, she served the church as a Deacon just when her daughter Devin was entering elementary school. Over time, she learned that Elder was truly her calling, which she has served 3 terms: 2007, 2022, and 2025. During her years as Elder, she has been the Finance Chair. She has also been very involved in the Lillie Circle. She was their Chair for 4 years, which part of her tenure was during the challenging COVID years. As stated in her nomination forms: "She is a person who helps wherever needed. Joined when we had many young people. A great person and worker. And always willing to lend a helping hand." Others have noted her dedication to her Lillie Circle sisters in providing transportation to their evening meetings. Kevin remarked that the Lillie Circle brings her JOY. Since the Lillie Circle has Monday evening meetings, she was able to stay connected to the church and its activities because there were many Sundays over many years that she was away with Kevin on the Traveling Softball circuit for her talented daughter, Devin. The Presbyterian Women are happy to recognize Deb Wallace as the 2026 recipient of the Honorary Life Membership. Congratulations.

VIRTUAL REVOLUTIONARY WAR BATTLE SITES WALK

We are still in Georgia, and bear northwest and walk to see where the Siege of Augusta was fought. Colonel Elijah Cook and Lt. Colonel James McCall led the attack. The British were under the command of Lt. Colonel Thomas Brown. He gathered help from the Cherokee Indians, yet the Patriots defeated them. Our next battlefield is at Kettle Creek, Georgia. This battle was the first major Patriot victory in the backcountry of Georgia. We leave Georgia and walk through the western part of South Carolina to the Ninety-Six battlefield. (1 on map) This battle was significant because of its location at the crossroads of trade routes. The population of Ninety-Six, SC, was split between Patriots who wanted independence and Loyalists who were loyal to Britain. Patriot General Nathaniel Greene was defeated by British Lt. Colonel John Cruger, who received backup from British Lord Rawdon. Next, we walk north to Cowpens, SC. During this battle, the Patriots executed a planned retreat to lure the British forces into a trap. Then they held a strong bayonet charge that surprised the British and caused their defensive lines to collapse. The British casualties were significantly greater than those of the Patriots, and the defeat caused General Cornwallis to temporarily abandon South Carolina. We will now walk through central North Carolina and arrive at the Battle of Guilford Courthouse, near present-day Greensboro. Both the British and Patriots fought a strong battle. It was considered a victory for the British, however General Cornwallis lost 25% of his men and was unable to pursue Major General Nathaniel Greene, who had retreated. Therefore, the battle was considered a loss to both sides. Located near Guilford Courthouse is the battlefield of Pyle's Massacre, which is at Graham, NC. Patriot Colonel Henry Lee led a surprise attack on the Loyalists, who were commanded by John Pyle. It was a decisive victory for the Patriots and marked a turning point in the British Southern Campaign. Next, we begin our tour of Virginia battlefields as we walk to Great Bridge. This battle was very important, as it was the first Patriot victory of the Revolutionary War. The Patriots forced Lord Dunmore, the British Royal Governor of Virginia, and his soldiers to evacuate and leave Virginia.

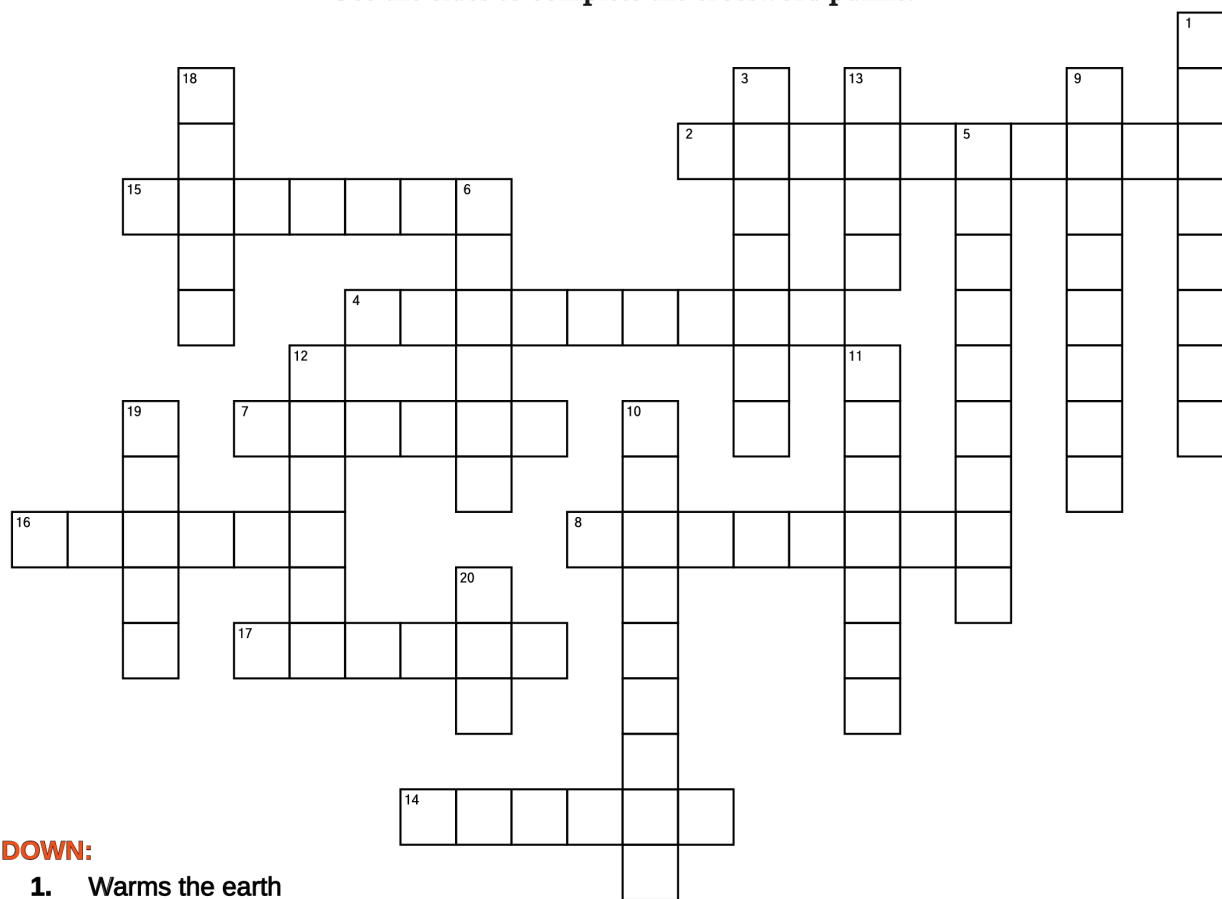
